GENERAL SCENARIO

The internet important part of adolescents' life (boyd 2008, 2014; Livingstone 2009)

The borders between online and offline spaces are disappearing into a continuum

The internet: highly sexualized environment

Sexual material is perceived as more accessible to minors than in the past (Attwood and Smith 2014)




